

FOOTSTEPS §






Can you remember back to January? There were times when it was very

For children it might be the games that led into stories and craft, followed by juice and sharing news from the 'news chair'.

temple in Jerusalem!
He would have remembered that!

Jesus was probably excited



being 12 years old and allowed to go on the annual long walk to the temple. The huge shining building with grand stone pillars, fine bronze gates and a courtyard the

size of five football pitches would have been very impressive, but the most important thing to the young Jesus was what happened inside the inner temple.

As a boy of 12 he didn't have to stay with the ladies and his mother in the women's court but was allowed to go in further to the men's court where the priests read from

the scrolls and the men talked about the history, the prophets and the promises of the



Old Testament. He was so keen to learn and join in the debate with the wise elders that he got left behind when his family started their long journey home.

Have you ever been left behind and lost? It can be very frightening and very worrying. It was for Jesus' parents too when they realised he

was missing. When Mary eventually found him still in the temple do you think she was very cross with him or very pleased and relieved he was safe? Perhaps a bit of both, but she might also have remembered the time the Angel came to tell her that she was to have God's son. Then there were those un-

usual gifts that the Wise men had brought and the strange way that

the old priest had seemed to recognise her baby when she took him to the temple to give thanks to God for his birth. Yes, Jesus was starting to learn about his heavenly father and prepare for his future work as God's son; a teacher, healer and friend to all. It was an important stage in his development.

We are lucky. We can come to church each week. We can see our friends and have fun as we learn more about following Jesus. We sing songs about God's greatness and speak to him in prayers that say thank you or sorry or please. We can also grow up to tell other
