It was great to welcome lots of familiar faces to our May



Footsteps when we heard the story of David and Goliath.

The afternoon started in church with badge making



and the quiz with some games to play as well. There was a pulley to load with blocks, a dom-

ino trail to construct and people to find in the lucky dip box.

Once everyone had finished playing and quizzing we gathered together to sing and hear our story. There was

the narrator with some of the children playing King Saul and David and others bringing in a giant cut out Goliath. Everyone else was either an Israelite or a Philistine depending on which side of church they were sitting having to cheer or boo at the right moment.

In the story, Goliath, a 3 me-



tre tall giant, challenged the Israelites to send out their bravest soldier to fight him, but no one volunteered - they were too scared. Then David, who was only a boy, came to

King Saul and said he would fight the Giant. The King gave him his armour, but it was so big and heavy that David couldn't move in it, so he took it off and just took his sling and five small pebbles. It was one of these that hit Goliath on the head, killing him and giving the Israelites victory over the Philistines. David went on to become a great king, and all because he had trusted in God to protect him and allow him to 'win' in a situation where everything seemed to be stacked against him.

Our minister, then led us in an action prayer before everyone moved through to the Maple Leaf room to make something from the story in the junk challenge.

There were several Goliaths, catapults and a donkey in church for the congregation to see the following morning. Do you think they guessed

#### what the story was?







Then, it was through to the hall for crafts and games.
There were biscuits to ice, a stone and pencil pot to colour, a catapult to make and a fully moving scene with flying stone and collapsing Goliath at the woodwork bench.



There were also more games, including building a tower as tall as Goliath, throwing bean bags up a ladder and rolling

marbles 'through the city gates'.

The afternoon finished as usual with tea - there were lots of sausage rolls, cheese straws, crisps and cakes (plus some fruit if you were being forced to be healthy) - and prizes for the quiz and games. Everyone is welcome


#### Surprise!
