

The festive season had come early to Formby Methodist Church with 'Christmas Footsteps' on Saturday 18th November. The afternoon started in church with badge and bag making, games, decorating a Christmas tree and the quiz. The questions ranged from 'Which prophet predicted the birth of Jesus?' (Isaiah) to 'How many mince pies

are eaten in the UK each year?' Estimates vary but it's about 800 million.



Everyone then gathered together to sing and watch a DVD telling the Christmas story. The main story was very familiar—Mary and Joseph, Jesus born in a stable, angels, shepherds and wisemen. ble but we didn't count them.


Camels were useful for transporting goods and

Our themes this term are 'Know Myself' and 'Take Ac-







Back in October some members of Explorers and Adventurers went to the NEC in Birmingham to attend the Youth weekend 3Generate. This is held every year for Methodist Children and Young People. This year 1,300 children and young people attended. This is a diary of the weekend.

Friday: It was a long journey to Birmingham and I did get bored halfway through. At the end of the journey I could see the place where we were staying, the NEC. I was very excited.

We came in, found our tents and got settled. Then we went to the village for dinner. This year we had something different to packed lunches, we had 'street food'.

Later on we had a look around the place as for some of us it was our first time at 3Generate. After that we got tired and decided to go to bed. I didn't have any sleep though! The next morning (Saturday), I went for breakfast then we went back to our tents to decide which activities to do.

There were loads to choose from. In one area we spun the wheel and it landed on 'care.' This was one of the 12 words on the wheel which helped us to think about how we should live. We then

found a yurt to sit in, it was really comfy and perfect for chatting!

After that in the same area, I also found a mirror which you could write on with a marker. We wrote words about God.

I went to an inflatable church later on and prayed for the fish in the middle of the Ocean.

We also had a planning session about what else we should do.

We went to a place called 'Sensory space' shaped like a dome where you can relax, I sat on a yoga ball.

The evening started with an 'After Eight' challenge. Can you get an After Eight from your forehead to your mouth without using your hands?

We then went to the silent disco and had fun.

On Sunday morning, we had a go at the artificial caving.
Some people tried climbing.

In the sensory space I was doing some string art.

The same day in the globe we experienced Taize (a kind of



worship which involves sing-

ing simple songs, readings and prayers as well as silence) and re-enacted the feeding of the 5,000 without fish.

By the end we were exhausted (especially the leaders). We ate our lunch, got on the coach and relaxed as we travelled home.





Did you visit the Shoebox Express Bazaar on 14th October? It seemed like all the Guides, Adventurers and Explorers



were there, manning stalls in the morning and

filling shoeboxes in the afternoon. They were kept very busy by the generous people who sponsored Christmas shoeboxes ahead of, or on the day.


