We also stumbled upon a new favourite game that's quickly become a hit. The girls race to the end of the room to find a malteser perched on a plate and the only thing separating them from their treat


is a layer of flour! The challenge of digging through the flour with only their faces was met with lots of laughter, and let's just say there were floury faces all around!






Christmas Eve Family Nativity Service
